They have all signed up to Levy Corona Helpers which was launched on Facebook in mid-March by Carey Bamber and Karen Clarke.

The idea is for those involved to put cards through doors in their area inviting people to phone if the they want a chat or need any help.

One of the co-ordinators. McPherson, said: "This is about neighbours supporting each other. One of the main things is posting the card. We're not professionals, we'll signpost people to professional support.

"It's amazing so many people have said, 'I'm happy to co-ordinate', right through to people who say 'I've got a skill, maybe I can offer something'."

The group has teamed up with Inspire which is using the Corona Helpers network to help deliver support to older people. Inspire is also the base for resources and meetings.
